Coulee Region Audubon Society meetings are held starting at 7 p.m. at the Ho Chunk Nation Building, lower level, 724 Main Street, La Crosse.

March 21

Alyssa Rod from the International Crane Foundation will present a program with pictures on the 15 species of cranes that are found around the world and what is being done to save them and their habitats from extinction. She will focus on native Sandhill and Whooping Cranes found in this area and address how attendees can help the crane population by participating in the Annual Midwest Crane Count.

Alyssa is the Lead Naturalist of the Conservation Education Department at the International Crane Foundation in Baraboo, Wisconsin. She has worked at ICF for six years and is Co-coordinator for the Annual Midwest Crane Count and the Children's International Art Exchange. Originally from Mendota, Illinois, she received her Bachelor of Sciences from Northland College in Ashland, Wisconsin.

ICF works worldwide to conserve cranes and the wetland and grassland ecosystems on which they depend. ICF is dedicated to providing experience, knowledge, and inspiration to involve people in resolving the threats to these beautiful birds.

eBird site helps the public track bird sighting, activities in Wisconsin

MADISON — How many bird species were seen in Dane County last year? Where can one go to find a boreal chickadee in February? When do sedge wrens begin arriving in southern Wisconsin?

Searching for answers to these and

other questions about birds in Wisconsin is now only a mouse-click away at Wisconsin eBird [ebird.org/wi/], a new Web site devoted to tracking bird

Highlights of the Christmas Bird Count

The Lax CBC was held on Saturday Dec 16th. There were 21 field observers with 1 feeder report and 55 species tallied. The weather for the CBC followed the pattern of the last few years. Early cold weather had frozen up much of the Mississippi and its tributaries and what snow had fallen earlier in the fall had melted. Almost all backwater areas were still frozen over and this was reflected in the low total numbers of waterfowl. We still managed 2 Great Blue

Hérons in spite of the ice. Nine different Raptor species were seen along with 3 Owl species and 2 N. Shrikes.

There were still good numbers of Robins around, especially in the Catholic Cemetary and 11 E. Bluebirds were reported.

With all the open ground conditions on count day the numbers reported might be down slightly from average. If there was an award given for effort, that award would go to Matt Paulson for the 2006 count. Matt left Whitewater Friday night after work, drove back to La Crosse, ar-

riving somewhere around 1 a.m., and spent the rest of the early hours owling around his count area. At daybreak Matt and his father, Lance, covered their area and then made it up to the potluck hosted by Mike Furr, where he appeared to be bright, awake, and lucid. Nice effort Matt!

I would like to take this time to announce that I would like to step down as compiler for the Lax CBC. The constraints brought on by our business have eaten up most of my free time in December and I have not done as thorough a job as needs to be done and I would like to apologize for the lateness getting the results out.. This count needs someone from the La Crosse area as compiler who can spend a little more time working with local newspapers and possibly TV to promote and recruit more participants. You could become famous! I will work with whoever decides to volunteer going over maps/routes and reporting procedures. If you have some free time please think seriously of volunteering!

They were very professional, well organized, fun, and very grateful that we all volunteered our time to be there. We should all be grateful to belong to such an incredible organization. I hope every Auduboner who is interested in being an Environmental Advocate gets a chance to attend this type of training. It is very empowering!

"I just met this AM with Kind's staffer,

Karrie Jackelen in La Crosse as a follow-up to my visit last week with one of his DC staffers. Ron was voting on the House floor that day for the 2007 Budget Continuing Resolution (CR), to keep the government running. The 2007 Federal Budget is a mess, and probably won't be cleaned up until fiscal 2008 starts on Oct. 1, 2007. So, I did not meet directly with him, but Rep. Kind called me at work on Monday as a follow-up, which was very nice. There were 21 people attending the Budget & Appropriations Training in DC from 12 states, and only two from Wisconsin. It was the first time that Audubon had done Budget & Appropriations training. They have reported that it was very successful based on com-

sightings and bird activities in the state.

“For centuries people have been keeping track of the birds they’ve seen, and where and when they’ve seen them,” says Andy Paulios, coordinator of the Wisconsin Bird Conservation Initiative for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. “Oftentimes those records are kept in a field notebook or another place where they can easily be lost and which are unavailable to others. With eBird, this critical information is both secure and immediately available to researchers, educators, conservation biologists, and other birders.”

Wisconsin eBird is an online database for recording and exploring bird sightings in the state of Wisconsin. Wisconsin eBird is the product of a partnership between the Wisconsin DNR, the Wisconsin Bird Conservation Initiative [www.wisconsinbirds.org] and the Wisconsin Society for Ornithology (WSO) [www.uwgb.edu/birds/wso/] (both links exit DNR).

“If you are interested in keeping track of your personal sightings or you are curious about the locations, migratory timing, or other aspects of birds, eBird is a great tool for you,” Paulios says.

The Wisconsin eBird Web site will be routinely updated with stories about bird

islaters, purchase decisions, and how we respond to teaching opportunities are all important for the future of our natural world. The next time that you are out on a nature hike or bird watching or just enjoying the natural beauty of the world around you, try to share some of your observations with people passing by. You never know how sharing a look at a bird or a bug will impact someone’s life and outlook on the world. It is worth a try. It may reap huge rewards.

identification, rare bird alerts, monitoring programs for birders to participate in, birding events and the latest bird research and monitoring efforts impacting “our” birds. From the Web site visitors can surf online to explore any and all bird sightings in Wisconsin as well as keep track of the sightings they have submitted.

The data compiled in eBird will be used to map and inventory species distributions, phenology, and populations and to plan management activities.

The Wisconsin Society for Ornithology has also begun incorporating eBird records into its records system. WSO members who regularly use eBird can now be assured that their eBird records are being used by WSO and all of its partners.

“eBird is free and can be used by beginners and experts alike,” Paulios says. “People can start now by entering their latest sighting or by exploring the interactive mapping tools and histograms. For example, you could create a seasonal checklist for your backyard, your neighborhood, or your county! Wisconsin is currently one of the most active eBird states in the country...let’s make sure we stay that way!”

ments from Congressional staffers.

“The other Wisconsinite and I met with a Feingold Environment and Energy staffer first thing in the AM, who was great, and then later, a staffer for Sen. Herb Kohl. They both were on board with all three Audubon Budget Items (Land & Water Conservation Fund (LWCF); National Wildlife Refuge System (NWRS); and Everglades Restoration), as was Kind’s staffer.

“However, Bush’s Proposed 2008 Budget is just more of the same - in fact he’s proposed to slash the LWCF by 30%, from FY ’07 of \$85 Million to \$58 Million in ’08. (This fund is supposed to be funded at \$900 Million per year per Congressional mandate in 1964 - and funded from Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) Off-shore oil & gas leasing fees!

“The NWRS did not fare much better, with only a paltry increase of \$2.4 Million from FY ’07. Still over \$300 Million underfunded! We have our work cut out for us.

Audubon Action

As Audubon enters its second century of conservation, it challenges all Americans to take action to protect birds and the environment. Here is the first of 10 recommendations from Audubon on what to do. For more see the Audubon.org website.

1. GET OUTSIDE

Spend at least two hours a week doing something out in nature—take a walk, ride a bike, work in the garden—and notice the birds and other wildlife that you see and hear. Take one of the Audubon field trips (see “Field Trips”, page 2), visit a wildlife refuge, a state park or a Mississippi Valley Conservancy property (see mississippivalleyconservancy.org)—and take the kids with you!

How will this help?

We protect what we value. And we value what we use. But with today’s hectic lifestyles it is increasingly difficult for

many of us, especially children, to enjoy the outdoors on a regular basis. Roper research shows that in 2003, only one in five Americans reported participating in outdoor recreation several times a week—and nearly a third did so less of-
