We've been enjoying Baltimore Orioles in our yard the past few days, a nice change of pace from the finches. In keeping with the fever of spring, there are lots of things happening. Here are some of those.

May 9 – International Migratory Bird Day event at the Trempealeau National Wildlife Refuge. Another great event with bird-related activities for the entire family. May 16 -- Wyalusing Field Trip. Dan Jackson and Scott Puchalski will lead a Coulee Region Audubon field trip to Wyalusing State Park starting at 6:30 at the entrance to the park. Wyalusing is the best birding destination in western Wisconsin and is the home to a number of special species of birds. This will also be their Birdathon day, so more eyes are welcome!

May 12 -Myrick Marsh Bird Walks. Start at 6:30 AM at the EcoPark building parking lot.

May 7 and May 14 -Hixon Forest Bird Walks. Meet at 6:30AM at the Hixon Forest parking lot.

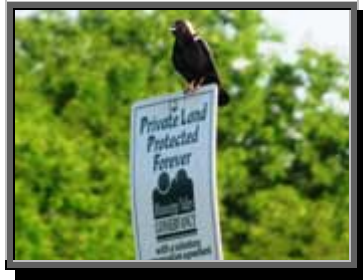

Sometimes birding might be part of the agenda beforehand, other times it's just a chance to meet others who share your interest. For example, when a Great Grey Owl decided to hang out on the grounds of the Capitol Brewery in Madison last year, there was a somewhat spontaneous Birds and Beers scheduled. Mississippi Valley Conservancy wants YOU!

Mississippi Valley Conservancy needs your HELP! We are seeking volunteers to help determine presence or absence of declining bird species on different sites throughout southwest Wisconsin. Volunteers essentially would go to a site in early morning and make a list of what is seen/heard on MVC nature preserves or land MVC holds conservation easements on. This invaluable information will help to guide our restoration activities and prioritize sites with great populations of state-listed bird species. We're hoping to schedule site visits for late May or early June.



Norwegian Ridge Trail Mothers Day Birding and Pancakes!

Many people see Tom Overlie on KTTC-TV nearly every day. This is a chance to meet and visit with him. He is coming to Spring Grove to cut the ribbon on the newly created 1.34 mile extension of the Norwegian Ridge Birding and Nature Trail at 11:30 on Mother's Day.

"I'm glad to be part of a news team that not only works hard to bring you the news each day, but works just as diligently to be a part of this community. It's an honor and commitment our news team takes very seriously."

It is an honor for our trail committee to have Tom here to inaugurate walking the newest link on a beautiful trail traversing a variety of landscapes. The wildflowers are blooming, birds are singing and nesting, goslings have hatched. It's marvelous.

A shuttle will leave from Red's on Highway 44 at 11:10 for those unable to walk. Another shuttle will run from the ribbon cutting to take non-walkers to the Sugar Shack for a pancake breakfast that is served from noon until 1:30. It's free although donations are gratefully accepted. The entire trail will be open. Walking from the trailhead near Red's to the ribbon-cutting site is about 1.25 miles, and could take up to 40 minutes. A water bottle will be given to the first 50 moms walking. Access birdsongs on your smartphones using QR codes on the 83 information signs. Please go to sgbirdwalk.org for more information.
