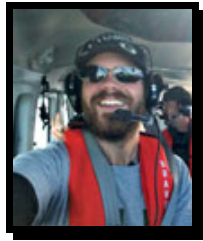

Christmas Bird Count

Eighty-nine people took part in the count this year and as a group we spent nearly 340 hours counting birds. That is an amazing level of support for this great annual event, and I really appreciate all the help and support!

We counted 22,482 birds of 80 species on Saturday, December 17th and 2 other species were seen in the 3 days prior to and after the count day and were added as "Count Week" species. Therefore, we found a new count record total of 82 species of birds!

Special finds included an Eastern Towhee, Snow Buntings, Snow Geese, a Merlin, American White Pelicans, Golden Eagles, White-winged Scoters, a Ruffed Grouse, an American Coot, Wilson's Snipe, and a Field Sparrow on Saturday as well as a Lapland Longspur and Eurasian Collared Doves during the count week period.

Thanks again for all your help to make this event such a success this year!

EnviroWednesdays Program

Jessica Stanton, USGS Biologist at the Upper Midwest Environmental Sciences Center, researcher and co-author of the Science magazine Report, “Decline of North American avifauna,” Kenneth V. Rosenberg et. al. (Science, 04 October 2019, vol. 366, Issue 646, pp. 120-124) will be our speaker this evening.

The report, using multiple and independent monitoring networks, documents avian population losses “approaching 3 billion birds, or 29% of their 1970 abundance.” Losses of this magnitude indicate threats of “avifaunal collapse and associated loss of ecosystem integrity, function, and services.”

Over 100 years ago our region experienced the decline and extinction of the Passenger Pigeon (approximately 3 billion lost from this one species). Stanton will draw upon some of her earlier work modeling the Passenger Pigeon’s fate to discuss our current bird population losses and the role of population monitoring and assessment programs.
